Conference Overview

The Italian Association of Energy Economists – AIEE, affiliate of the International Association for Energy Economics – IAEE, is organizing the 10th AIEE Energy Symposium on Energy Security on November 25–26, 2026, with the scientific contribution and cooperation of the University of Turin, Department of Economics and Statistics “Cognetti de Martiis”.

The Symposium has become an important annual forum for discussing the evolving concept of energy security in a rapidly changing geopolitical context. The 2026 edition will address key challenges shaping the global energy landscape, including the Middle East energy crisis, the emergence of new geopolitical and industrial actors, the impact of artificial intelligence and data centres on energy demand, and the transformation driven by the energy transition.

A central focus will be the link between climate change, energy policy and national security, with attention to mitigation and adaptation strategies and their implications for a decarbonised energy system. Through plenary sessions, keynote presentations and concurrent sessions, the event will offer an international platform for networking and knowledge exchange in the modern setting of the University of Turin, in the context of a historic city, once Italy's first capital, known for elegant baroque architecture, grand piazzas, renowned museums, rich cuisine and the Alps backdrop.

Call for Abstracts - Important deadlines

The call for papers extended to **September 20, 2026**

The abstract acceptance result of submissions received until **July 31st, 2026** will be notified by **August 20, 2026**

Submission information:

Concurrent sessions will be organized from accepted abstracts.

Authors wishing to make paper presentations during the Concurrent Sessions must submit an abstract that briefly describes the research topic to be presented.

Submitted short papers should include (1) overview, (2) methods, (3) results and (4) conclusions, conforming to the structure outlined in the template. Submissions are limited to no more than three pages in length.

Authors whose abstracts are accepted and will be presented in the conference sessions will have time until **October 30, 2026**, **to submit their full papers** if they want to publish them in the conference proceedings. It is not obligatory to send the full paper, unless the authors are interested to publish it.

While multiple submissions by individual or groups of authors are welcome, the abstract selection process will seek to ensure as broad participation as possible: each speaker is to deliver only one presentation in the conference. If multiple submissions are accepted, then a different co-author will be required to pay the speaker registration fee and present the paper.

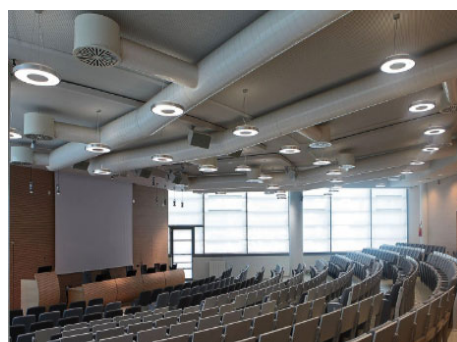
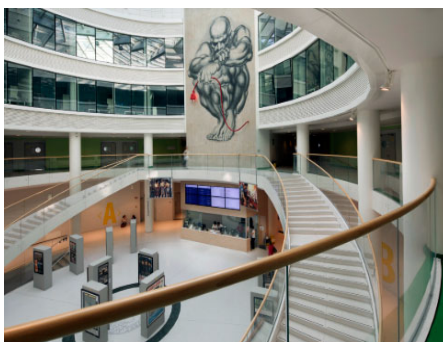
CAMPUS LUIGI EINAUDI - University of Turin, Department of Economics and Statistics "Cognetti de Martiis"

The Luigi Einaudi Campus, located along the banks of the Dora River at a short distance from the Mole Antonelliana, and of the city center is one of the University of Turin's newest and most iconic buildings. Designed by Norman Foster and listed by CNN as one of the 10 most spectacular university buildings in the world, it houses the School of Legal, Political, and Economic-Social Sciences.

The Campus occupies an area of over 45,000 square meters and consists of seven buildings overlooking a circular plaza. The buildings, wrapped in transparent façades with soft lines, a luminous, suspended undulating roof, with open passageways that connect the public areas with the internal garden.

The campus also includes the Norberto Bobbio Library, which contains over 650,000 volumes and specializes in anthropology, economics, law, and political and social sciences. It covers an area of approximately ten thousand square meters and offers approximately 800 seats.

The Campus features modern rooms, computer and language labs, study and reading rooms, a cafeteria and spacious common areas and a student residence. A venue for national and international events exhibitions, and meetings, it comprises seven buildings surrounded by green areas and a large circular plaza. It was designed with visual, auditory, and environmental comfort, with particular attention to energy efficiency.



Students

Students are especially encouraged to participate and may attend the conference at the reduced student registration rate.

Two awards of €500 each will be granted to the best papers presented by early-career researchers, including PhD students and postdoctoral fellows. Priority will be given to papers in which the young researcher is the first author.

Welcome to Turin

a multifaceted city rich in historic splendour



Turin was Italy's first capital and it was described by Le Corbusier as *"the city with the most beautiful natural setting"*.

Turin boasts a great artistic and cultural heritage: the elegant aristocratic residences of times gone by, breathtaking Baroque architecture, bountiful museums and priceless monuments create a unique blend between past and present.



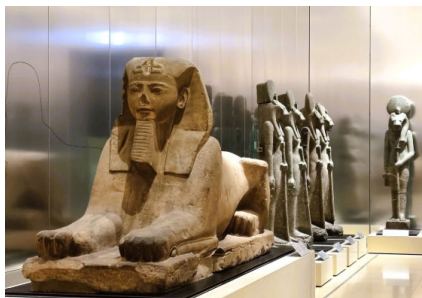
The Conference venue, at Campus Einaudi is at 15 minutes' walk from the city historical center

Be prepared to step into Turin's incredible architecture. You can definitely feel Turin's impressive history while strolling between huge columns on Via Roma, a posh shopping street running between **Piazza Castello** and **Piazza Carlo Felice**. This area is also the historical center of Turin.

The Egyptian Museum is renowned for having the most important collection of Egyptian exhibits outside of Cairo.

The Royal Palace - The imposing Palazzo Reale was built in the 16th century as one of the seats of the House of Savoy and, later, the Kings of Sardinia. It includes the Palazzo Chiabrese now home to a museum of the history of Piedmont. It is also adjacent to the Chapel of the Holy Shroud, (a UNESCO World Heritage Site).

Turin Cathedral, was completed in 1498 and is the seat of the Archbishops of Turin. Dedicated to Saint John the Baptist, the cathedral is perhaps best known as the resting place of the **Turin Shroud**, which is kept in the adjacent Chapel of the Holy Shroud, built by the famous architect Guarino Guarini in 1668. The Shroud of Turin is only displayed infrequently but the cathedral is undoubtedly dominated by the atmosphere of its resting place.



The **Mole Antonelliana** was built in 1889 and was originally conceived as a synagogue. It is still the tallest self-supporting brick building in the world and if you take the panoramic lift to the top you will enjoy some splendid views of the city. The building has become the symbol of Turin and offers a great combination of magnificent views, stunning architecture and a fascinating history of cinema.

Palazzo Madama, was built in the 15th century, although parts of the building date back to Roman times. It housed the first Senate of the Kingdom of Italy and today is home to the Turin City Museum of Ancient Art. There is a focus on the Piedmont region and artisan crafts from the area, which give you a real insight into the history of this fascinating part of Italy.

The **Palazzo Carignano** is an architectural gem designed by Guarino Guarini in 1679. It has a uniquely undulating facade and a breathtaking double dome in the main salon, which once housed the first Italian parliament.



How to reach Turin



By airplane

Airport Torino-Caselle "Sandro Pertini" (16 km north of Turin)

Train: connects the airport station to Turin's main stations (e.g., Porta Susa and Lingotto). The journey takes approximately 19-30 minutes.

Bus: Shuttle buses connect the airport to Porta Nuova and Porta Susa stations in 40-45 minutes, with departures every 15-30 minutes.

Taxi: By taxi it takes approximately 30 minutes.



By train

Turin's central station, **Torino Porta Nuova**,

Is the city's main railway hub. Strategically located in the heart of the city (on Piazza Carlo Felice), it is approximately 1.3 km from the heart of the city and is well-connected by public transport.
